Without this impulse in the traditional strathspey tunes, which is lacking in airs and some of the modern "strathspeys", you get a wishy washy, floaty style of dancing. No wonder some people find strathspeys boring.

COURTESY AND ETIQUETTE (part III)

In the last edition of Broun's Reel, two articles by Helen and Malcolm Brown picked up on a theme I had introduced in an earlier editorial, concerning the norms and conventions at a dance. To Helen, these stemmed from, and led to, courtesy and respect towards other dancers. At a couple of dances following that issue of Broun's Reel, it was sad to see that these were often still not observed!

In conversations with others in the last few months, some further points have been raised, which apply equally at classes too. I suppose that "courtesy and respect" are at the heart of these too, though this time courtesy to the MC or to the teacher rather than other dancers.

"Do you need a walk-through?" asks the MC at a dance, and the response is affirmative. "WE don't need a walk-through" say couple number one, feeling rather superior as the other sets walk the dance. At worst, they may even have a quiet chat, not helping the MC or those trying to follow the MC's instructions – compounded when someone moves out of place to join in the conversation. "We know the next bit" think the dancing couple in another set, zipping through the figures and going onto the next 8 bars as well. The poor MC has no hope of working out who has done what, or failed to do it, or where anyone in the room is in the dance. Neither does the inexperienced couple in third place who were confused by hearing the MC's instructions, 4th woman's instructions and watching 1st couple clearly doing something that was neither. "Well, we knew what we were doing" is unhelpful to say the least!

In class situations, this is parallelled by the helpful dancer who keeps giving instructions to a less experienced partner. Hand signals, head nods (and even the odd word – "Up" or "left") is OK) are helpful, as are holding on for a split second or letting go a fraction early. But to give all the instructions while an MC is recapping or a teacher coaching through the dance seems disrespectful, even given the best of intentions. Whose instructions should the poor dancer follow? Is it even implied that there is no need to listen to the teacher or MC? Certainly unintended, but possibly the effect.

One year the annual workshop and dance at Bedale covered some more abstruse John Drewry dances. I had completely failed to grasp the middle section of one dance, but found myself making up a set for it in the evening. I'm somewhere in the middle, lost, and four people, one at each corner, all yell something at me. After the dance, 4th woman asked, "But why did you come to me instead of going round first corner?" "Because you yelled the loudest," I replied. Multiple well-intentioned instructions had all failed!

So PLEASE, for the sake of the poor MC:

- don't get ahead of the instructions in the recap
- don't talk while the MC or the teacher is talking
- ask the MC or the teacher instead of your partner if in doubt
- remember you can help your partner without words!
