#### Editorial

"Welcome to the Centenary Edition of Broun's Reel!" is how I'd like to start today. However, that would imply we only had RSCDS Centenary material in the newsletter, so I can't. (Hmm!) Nevertheless, this edition does have a focus on the RSCDS's Centenary, both via this editorial and the inclusion of several photos. Please excuse a slightly longer editorial than usual! And my apologies to those who know more than I do about the founding of the RSCDS: I'm beginning with a *very* potted history of the Society.

The SCDS – it hadn't yet acquired the R – was formed in 1923, aiming to preserve the "delightful national dances of Scotland" and their particular character. Miss Jean Milligan, a PE lecturer at Jordanhill College, Glasgow, with a long-standing interest in the country dances of Scotland, and Mrs. Ysabel Stewart (of Fasnacloich – *that* Mrs. Stewart), Guide Commissioner for Argyll, founded the Society in order to preserve and promote Scotlish country dancing. They saw the values inherent in their own dance tradition in the face of the threat from popular jazz and American dancing which rural Scotland had resisted prior to World War 1.

One of the remarkable attributes of traditional Scottish country dancing, for Miss Milligan and other writers, was that it was for all levels of society, rather than for any particular class. In today's phrasing, it was very inclusive. The "friendly social spirit so characteristic of Scottish gatherings of the past", they felt, was being

lost. Miss Milligan insisted that "Scottish dancing belonged to all grades of society" (from *Won't You Join the Dance?*) She was also very definite, however, that SCD was ballroom dancing rather than folk dancing. My own thought is that even if this were once true, SCD really has a foot in both camps nowadays.

The shortage of men (especially young ones) after the war led to the adoption of a custom we now take for granted. Quite simply, there weren't enough men to go round. Women therefore had to dance in the man's position – and quite clearly they were "ladies dancing in the man's position", with frequent changes of partner: Miss Milligan did not approve of cliques keeping the same partner in 'superior' sets! I have always thought of this as 'sharing the men around' – no exclusive "dibs" on them in a dance. It was great to be at a dance just once when there were more men than women!

This inclusivity has meant that now Scottish Country Dancing can be danced by anyone, anywhere. The RSCDS has a world-wide presence, and dancers in so many countries feel bonded by the enthusiasm we have in common for our dancing. The influence of the RSCDS also means that wherever you go, not only in the UK but in all four corners of the globe, you will find the same dancing and the same spirit.

What does the RSCDS mean to me? I believe passionately in its aims. I love the dancing and dancing with a group, and especially I love the amazing feeling that comes from a set which dances together almost as a single unit. I love the music! I love it all! I ascribe a great deal of what social confidence I have to Scottish Country dancing. Most of all, I love to see people coming away really happy from dancing on a Monday night.

Monday nights are like so many things in the SCD world. They wouldn't happen if it weren't for so many people giving their time and energy voluntarily. Douglas sweeps the floor before we begin so that we can dance on it. Lynne takes the money and books the hall so we have somewhere to dance. A small team organizes the tea and biscuits

between them. They wash up! People stack the chairs away at the end and draw the curtains. No one asks them. They just do it. Thank you, all of you.

This weekend (as I write) sees the Coronation of King Charles III. He has stressed the importance of volunteers at all levels in our society, and this is true of so many in our dance world too. At all of our dances, someone has volunteered to take the money, to sort the room if needed, to put the kettle and make tea, to bring that equipment, to record the playlist if needed, to open up, to lock up, to MC, to look out for others. These are not just members of the committee, but noncommittee members of the dancing community too. At HQ, much of the RSCDS is likewise organized – kept going, if you like – by other volunteers who feel they are giving something back. The King's late mother was our Patron and a dancer, and surely appreciated how useful volunteers are to an organization like ours. So, thank you, all of you who volunteer, whatever it is that you do. We couldn't run without you.

One of the chief preoccupations of many is the future of the Society, with membership in the UK in decline. We really do have to look to the future. How can we recruit more people? Especially younger ones? Do people see in us the great joy we have in our dancing? And if not, why not? I think it's a really hopeful sign that our own Branch is launching new things in the Society's  $100^{th}$  anniversary year – all led by volunteers, of course! There is Angie's work on social media, Carol's on the Yorkshire Diary, the new website. I think it is really important that we are looking ahead.

Miss Jean Milligan ended her introduction to the first SCD Manual *Won't you join the dance?* thus:

"The greatest object now for the RSCDS is to spread friendship and happiness wherever it goes." I hope it still does, and will continue to do so for many years to come.

#### A SIGNIFICANT DEVELOPMENT

Monday 17 April was a significant event in this year's calendar, but one which most of you won't have been aware of at the time. It was the day on which the new online Yorkshire Diary was finally launched, nearly a year after the idea was initially discussed by Helen Russell, Angie Francksen and me, and seven months from when work started on it in earnest.

For those of you who haven't yet had a chance to "play" with it, the online Diary replaces the former paper version, with which I'm sure you were all familiar. Malcolm did sterling work editing this for many years, and I had originally volunteered to take it over from him. Then Covid struck, and as we all know, almost everything to do with SCD was put on hold.

By the time dancing restarted, it seemed appropriate to move the Diary online. While it is sad in some ways to see the demise of the paper version, which served as a useful and valuable reference guide, the new Diary has many advantages. For instance, the Branches and Clubs who subscribe to it can alter and add information at any stage during the year. They can even put in details for events taking place at any point in the next five years, the hope being that this will minimise any clashes of dates, which inevitably impact on attendance.

As well as listing dances, the Diary also gives details of SCD classes, workshops, and day schools, so it offers a wealth of information. There is even the option to download cribs for dances, where subscribers have made these available for inclusion (see User Guide for instructions).

Although it has always been called the Yorkshire Diary, the online version continues to cover a broader area which encompasses areas such as Newcastle, North West Craven, Retford etc.

To have a look at the Diary, log on to the Branch website at rscdsyork.org. Here you can open up the Diary, by clicking on its logo. There is also a link next to the logo to the User Guide, which will take you step by step through how to use the Diary, until you become familiar with it.

We hope you enjoy the Yorkshire Diary and find it useful. If you have any comments or queries about it, do please get in touch.

#### **SUMMER DANCING 2023**

When summer arrives, most SCD Branches and Clubs stop dancing until the start of the new season in September. Those of you who would like to carry on dancing during July and August will be glad to hear that we are running weekly dance sessions over the summer again this year.

We are returning to last summer's venue, Askham Bryan's quaint village hall, which is a former chapel. It is situated on the main street of Askham Bryan village, and is easily accessible from York, Harrogate, Leeds and surrounding areas.

Everyone is welcome to attend, and for as many or as few sessions as you like. As before, we will be doing a mixture of familiar dances and ones that may be new to you. Most of the dances will be walked through, except for a few easy dances each week, which will be recapped.
